


History Continued

Roy Bean operated a mercantile here in the 1860s before moving to West Texas to gain fame as Judge Roy Bean “The Law West of the Pecos.”

The area surrounding Pinos Altos has a rich history of ranching where some of the largest ranches in the country once were located not far from town. Take a drive and you’ll see evidence of ranching all around: windmills, stock tanks, and corrals. The cowboys, though, often work far from the road. When you see one, you’re seeing someone with one foot in the past, the other in the present and completely steeped in the traditions that helped settle the West.

Today, P.A. (as it is known by locals) has a charming main street that feels like an old western movie set. Many of the old buildings date back to the 1800s and have been restored with original memorabilia and artifacts. It has a population of 300.

While in town, visitors can walk through the pages of downtown history at historical sites and museum tours; enjoy great food and entertainment; try their hand at gold panning; or simply delight in the beautiful mountain views of the Gila National Forest.



Historic Pinos Altos is a charming old gold-mining town located seven miles north of Silver City on NM 15 at an elevation of 7000 feet.


A BIT OF HISTORY

Historic Pinos Altos (Spanish for “tall pines”) is a very old mining town; it was Grant County’s first county seat. The town site is located along the Continental Divide at an elevation of 7,000 feet in the southern end of the Pinos Altos Mountains of the Gila National Forest. The town began in 1860 when three frustrated 49-ers, Thomas Birch, Colonel Snively and another guy named Hicks, stopped to take a drink in Bear Creek and discovered gold. Word spread like wildfire, soon there were over 700 men prospecting in the area.

There were conflicts between the miners and the Indians. Pinos Altos’ history includes the Apache War of September 22, 1861, where Cochise joined the 400 strong Chiricahua Apaches under Mangas Coloradas to drive away miners from their traditional homeland. Captain Thomas Marston, Arizona Scout, and many others on both sides died in this battle.



HISTORICAL MUSEUM

A collection of mining artifacts and historic memorabilia is on display. The museum is housed in a log cabin (circa 1860s) that has been in the Schafer family for over 130 years. 8 THE FIRST COURT HOUSE

(c.1871) and hanging tree in the county was located on Main Street in Pinos Altos. Although the building is currently a private residence, it can be viewed easily from Main Street just south of Bear Creek.

7 THE BEAR CREEK MOTEL AND CABINS


The Cabins are located along Bear Creek at the intersection of Main Street and NM 15. 6 THE CATHOLIC CHURCH (c. 1888) & PINOS ALTOS CEMETERY

Located on NM 15, the cemetery offers "historic attractions" in the form of headstones over graves of people who died in Apache raids. Notables include Captain Thomas Marston and his brother Virgil.

5 THE PINOS ALTOS ORCHARDS AND GIFT SHOP

Located on the site of the old Clark

13 THE HEARST METHODIST

CHURCH (circa 1898)

The adobe church located on Gold Street is open Thursday–Monday, throughout the summer, and serves as the home of the Grant County Art Guild. View their work 10 a.m. – 5 p.m., Thursdays – Sundays throughout the summer.




14 THE McDONALD LOG CABIN

(circa 1851), located on Spring Street, directly behind the Opera House. John McDonald, an old Indian fighter, was reportedly in this area in 1851. Probably the oldest house in the county.

THE HEARST MINE

The source for gold used in decorating the Hearst Castle in California, is located one mile south of Pinos Altos on NM 15 on private land. This is just a point of interest and is not open to the public.

Located on the site of the old Clark and Massingil orchards at 13 Placer St. The shop features a unique collection of work from local artists as well as homemade jams, jellies and imports. 4 CONTINENTAL DIVIDE RV PARK

The RV Park is located in the middle of an apple orchard at the entrance to town. The RV park offers beautiful views of the Gila National Forest, has excellent facilities for recreational vehicles, and also has private cabins and tent sites. Call for reservations, 575/388-3005.

3 TWO SPIRITS CAFE

The cafe is located at Highway 15 at the fork in the road. Open from 6 a.m. — 2 p.m., Wednesday through Sunday. Two Spirits serve a moderately priced breakfast and lunch menu. Ask about their boxed lunch selection. 575-388-1659



2 THE PINOS ALTOS VOLUNTEER FIRE AND RESCUE HOUSE

is located on NM 15 at the entrance of the town. It is one of the most photographed sites in town even though it is not a historic building.
